
A Levels

- •Description: Study a subject you took at GCSE in greater depth or choose a new one that you're interested in. You could take 3 broad subjects you are interested in to keep your career options open or choose ones you need for a specific career.
- •Duration: 2 years
- Assessment: Mostly exams at the end of the

course

- •Level of study: 3
- •Entry requirements: Course dependent, typically 5 GCSEs Grade 9-4 (usually including English and Maths)
- •Work experience: Usually 1 week during year 12
- •Leads to: University/college, higher and degree apprenticeships, work

Academic





T Levels

Academic

•Description: Designed in partnership with employers to give you the skills and knowledge to get on in the workplace. Combines classroom learning with industry placements to prepare you for skilled work or higher level study. 1 T Level is the equivalent of 3 A levels.

- •Duration: 2 years with 3 month work placement
- Assessment: Exams, projects & practical assignments
- •Level of study: 3
- •Entry requirements: Course dependent
- •Work experience: At least 45 days on industry placement
- •Leads to: University/college, higher and degree apprenticeships, work as you still earn UCAS Points.

BTEC

Description: A flexible vocational pathway that allows you to study a particular subject such as hair dressing or bricklaying, alongside or instead of A-Levels. You

will develop practical skills and knowledge that employers

will love.

Duration: 1 or 2 years


Assessment: Mainly assessment based

 Level of study: Can be completed at different levels (more on next slide)

• Entry requirements: Course dependent, dependent on level of study

Leads to: Higher and degree apprenticeships, work

BTEC

It's important to remember that BTECs start at different levels. You must select the most appropriate level for you- don't undersell yourself!

On some course e.g. bricklaying at City College you have to start on a level 1 course

Apprenticeships

- •Description: Intermediate, advanced higher and degree apprenticeships combine practical on-the-job skills training with off-the-job learning. You'll get training that is relevant to your job and be paid a salary Start at a level to suit you, with support if you have special needs or a disability.
- •Location: You'll spend 80% of your time in the workplace and 20% off-the-job with some study in a college or training centre
- •Duration: A minimum of 1 year generally longer!
- •Entry requirements: Will be dependent on the industry, job role and apprenticeship level
- •Qualifications: apprenticeship certificate, diploma, degree and masters depending on level
- •Leads to: Work, next level of apprenticeship, further education, higher education





Apprenticeships are available in over 1500 job roles across 280 skills and industries from engineering to veterinary nursing, accounting to digital media.



LEVEL 2 Intermediate apprenticeships

Typical length

12-18 months

Entry requirements:

None or few

Qualifications obtained:

GCSE, BTEC or equivalent

Who's it for?

Mostly for 16-year-olds with limited or no academic qualifications.



LEVEL 3 Advanced apprenticeships

Typical length

12-24 months

Entry requirements:

Usually 5 GCSEs

Qualifications obtained:

A levels or equivalent

Who's it for?

Mostly for 16-year-olds with reasonable academic achievements but who don't want to study in sixth form.



LEVEL 4/5 *Higher apprenticeships*

Typical length

3-5 years

Entry requirements:

A levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained:

Higher national diploma / foundation degree

Who's it for?

Mostly for those who want to qualify for professional career paths without attending university or college. Sometimes referred to as 'school leaver' or 'non-graduate' programmes.



LEVEL 6/7Degree apprenticeships

Typical length

3-7 years

Entry requirements:

At least 2 A levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained:

A BA or BSc degree or higher

Who's it for?

Mostly for those with excellent sixth form results that want to study for a degree or similar whilst working. Aimed at attracting high-calibre candidates to bridge professional skills gaps.



Apprenticeships

You can look for Apprenticeships on www.findapprenticeships.service.gov.uk

Remember apprenticeships are advertised all year round, so many won't be available until after Christmas.

Apprenticeships suit students who:

- Want to start earning money
- Like to learn while doing a task
- Want to gain experience in the work-place

You can do A-Levels first and then do a higher level apprenticeship.



Apprenticeships

- •Must have a back-up of a full-time course!
- Benefits of an apprenticeship
 - Earn a salary whilst in a real job
 - Learn job specific skills
 - Gain a variety of transferable skills
 - Progress into higher education
 - Work towards nationally recognised qualifications



Most apprenticeships won't be advertised until after Christmas, you apply for them later than you would a college course!



Start thinking...

- Do you want to stay in full-time education or work and study part time?
- What subjects do you want to study?
- Do you want to train for a specific career or keep your options open?

Career development is a lifelong journey & the world of work is always changing!

It's important to keep learning & developing your skills and abilities throughout your life!

Have a back-up plan...



- Even if you know what you want to do it is a good idea to have a back-up plan
- Particularly important if you are aiming to do a popular course or career
- You may need to change your plans if you do not get on your chosen course or find it difficult getting an apprenticeship, traineeship or job

On the home page select the register button on the top right hand





Applying to your course...

- You should be starting to look at your options Post 16 and begin making a start on your applications.
- Applications should be done as soon as possible, ideally before Christmas. Do NOT leave it till March to apply!
- Applications for apprenticeships are usually later in the year!



Finance for Learning...

Between the ages of 16-19 if studying full time all tuition and course fees will be **paid**, unless the course is at a private, fee paying school or college.

<u>16-19 Bursary Fund</u> –School sixth forms, colleges and training providers have hardship funds to help students if they are starting a full time course and think they may struggle with the costs. Student services staff, training tutors or Head of Sixth Form are contact points up to £1200 is available to students most in need:


- Young people in care
- Young people claiming income support or Universal Credit
- Young people getting Employment support Allowance or Disability Living Allowance

<u>Child Benefit</u> will continue provided they stay in full time education and one parent or carer meets the government earning allowance. At present, you cannot claim child benefit if your son/daughter is on an apprenticeship.
